1	The meeting commenced.)
2	MR. WELLS: Good evening. I welcome everyone to
3	tonight's scoping meeting. We'll start our evening with
4	the Pledge of Allegiance by Constable Constaglio (phonetic
5	spelling).
6	MR. CONSTAGLIO: Whoever is wearing a hat,
7	please take it off.
8	I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United
9	States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands,
10	one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice
11	for all.
12	MR. WELLS: Before we get started, the exits are
13	at the rear of the hall here. And there's one on the
14	right, one on the left. Men's and ladies' rooms are
15	directly back with labels by the doorways.
16	My name is Frederick Wells. I'm from Tim Miller
17	Associates Planners. We've been retained by the Village to
18	prepare the environmental impact statement. And tonight,
19	I'm facilitating this meeting.
20	Before I get into protocol for tonight's
21	session, I'd like to introduce the village mayor who has a
22	few words of welcome.
23	MR. WIEDER: Good evening. My name is Abraham
24	Wieder. I'm the mayor of the Village of Kiryas Joel. On
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1	behalf of the village trustees, Mr. Goldstein, Mr. Landau,
2	Mr. Reisman, and Mr. Freund, and on behalf of the Monroe
3	Town Board members, Supervisor Doles, Mr. Burke, Mr.
4	Walters, Mr. McWatters, Mr. Colon, welcome to Kiryas Joel.
5	I thank you for taking the time to join us in this
6	evening's scoping session.
7	Also joining me on the dais is Village
8	Administrator Mr. Szegedin, Government Relations
9	Representative, Mr. Felberman, along with a team of
10	professionals who tonight's emcee will introduce you
11	shortly.
12	The purpose of this voluntary scoping session is
13	to receive public comments on the proposed annexation of
14	five hundred and seven acres from the Town of Monroe into
15	the Village of Kiryas Joel. This proposed annexation was
16	initiated by the owners of the five hundred and seven acres
17	by the owners of the five hundred and seven acres,
18	themselves. And in response to their petition, the State
19	D.E.C., on January 28, 2015, designated the Village Board -
20	- the Village Board of Kiryas Joel as the lead agency.
21	In its decision, the D.E.C. lauded Kiryas Joel
22	development practices as follows, and I quote, compact,
23	high-density development is more likely to result in a
24	community that is more walkable, bikeable, and more

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Page 4 conducive to mass transit while reducing vehicle miles 1 traveled and generation of greenhouse gas -- greenhouse 2 gases, emission from combustion. 3 4 As a general rule high density development appropriately cited is considered more environmentally 5 6 sustainable and converse open space -- and conserves open 7 space. I thank the D.E.C. for that decision. 8 9 In this capacity, the Village Board is now 10 conducting an environmental review on what impact to adding 11 five hundred and seven acres to the Village of Kiryas Joel 12 would have on the village and on the town as a whole. The village trustee and I are pleased to host tonight's session 13 14 and to listen to your comments. We look forward to hearing 15 you -- to hearing from you. 16 And for those who are unable to attend this 17 evening session, we invite them to submit written comments 18 to Mr. Miller's office by March 10. All comments, both 19 verbal and written, will receive equal consideration. 20 Thank you. 21 MR. WELLS: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. 22 With me tonight as part of the environmental 23 team, Mike Sterthous from the law firm of Whiteman, Osterman, and Hanna, who is advising the Village on SEQRA 24

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matters.

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2	By way of background, a petition was filed with
3	the Town of Monroe and the Village of Kiryas Joel to annex
4	approximately five hundred seven acres of land presently in
5	the Town of Monroe to the Village. This petition was filed
6	pursuant to New State General Municipal Law in December
7	2013. There're maps posted that show the location of the
8	proposed annexation. The smaller map here is just Kiryas
9	Joel with a greenish area is the petition annexation
10	territory. And the larger map shows all of the Town of
11	Monroe with the Villages of Kiryas Joel and Harriman, and
12	Monroe shown in various colors. The same maps are in the
13	back of the hall, as well.
14	The Village and Town's consideration of the
15	annexation petition is an action that's subject to the
16	requirements of the New York State Environmental Quality
17	Review Act, also referred to as SEQRA. Under SEQRA, the
18	Village will the lead agency for this review. The Village
19	has adopted a positive declaration, requiring a Generic
20	Environmental Impact Statement, or G.E.I.S. The Town of
21	Monroe is an involved agency and the only other decision-
22	making body involved in this action of annexation.
23	The E.I.S. is called generic because the
24	proposed action does not include any decision on site-

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1	specific development proposals. Tonight's meeting is for
2	the express purpose of soliciting input to finalize the
3	draft scope for the generic E.I.S.
4	This is a scoping session, not a public hearing.
5	A draft scope has been prepared by the Village's
6	consultants and advisors, and copies are available at the
7	back of the room. The scope is basically the outline of
8	what will be used to prepare the draft E.I.S. That scope
9	is also posted online at W W W dot K J dash SEQRA dot com
10	slash five O seven acres. That website will have all the
11	documents that will be publicly filed in connection with
12	this proceeding, including the environmental impact
13	statement when it is prepared.
14	There are signup sheets in the back of the room
15	for anyone wishing to comment on the scoping outline
16	tonight. If you wish to speak, please be sure to get your
17	name on one of the sign-up lists in the back. If you have
18	written comments to submit, please be sure to hand them to
19	me before the end of the meeting.
20	The goals of the scoping meeting are to focus
21	the environmental studies on potential adverse
22	environmental impacts that may occur as a result of the
23	annexation and to eliminate from consideration those issues
24	that are irrelevant or non-significant. Scoping is not

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1 required under SEQRA, but the Village understands and 2 appreciates the community's interest in the proposed action 3 and seeks input for addressing potential environmental 4 issues and defining the analysis that will be provided in 5 the impact statement.

The draft scoping outline is like a table of 6 7 contents for the G.E.I.S. The purpose of this meeting is to take your comments on that outline to ascertain if 8 there's anything missing that should be further examined 9 10 under the environmental review. As you can see from the 11 draft scoping outline, the document will include a detailed 12 description of the proposed action, along with the projection of the future development and growth likely to 13 14 take place in and around the village without the 15 annexation, compared to what might happen with annexation.

16 It -- as already been identified in the scoping 17 outline, the E.I.S. will contain chapters on land use and zoning, demographics and housing, economics, including tax 18 19 implications to the school districts with and without 20 annexation. It will address community services, such as police and fire protection, schools, utilities such as 21 22 water and sewer services, traffic, transportation, natural and cultural resources. The E.I.S. document will also 23 24 include an assessment of the one-hundred-sixty-four-acre

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Page 8 annexation petition as an alternative that was filed in 1 2 August 2014. The document will also set forth thresholds for 3 4 future reviews as independent development proposals are 5 advanced in the annexation lands. After tonight's meeting, there will be a period to 6 7 receive written comments on the draft scope. These comments can be addressed to Tim Miller Associates. Our 8 9 mailing address is on the public notice for this meeting 10 and they should be postmarked no later than March 10th. 11 You can also email comments to Tim at Tim Miller Associates 12 dot com. And please indicate your name and address on any comments that are submitted. 13 14 Everyone, tonight, that wishes to speak will be 15 given three minutes. Please respect this time so that all 16 who wish to speak can be heard. We will -- we are 17 recording this -- videotaping this meeting and the 18 videotape will be transcribed so there will be a written 19 record that will also be posted on the website. 20 We'll start with a representative of the Applicant, and then continue with a list of other speakers. 21 22 The first speaker will be Simon Gelb. 23 Before we begin, I'll go over few items. Ι 24 invite everyone to follow a few guidelines for tonight's

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1	meeting. Please state your name and address before you
2	make your comments. Please address your comments to me.
3	This is not a meeting to answer questions or respond to
4	comments, but rather, to gather information and your input
5	on the scope so that we can develop a scope for the E.I.S.
6	Pertinent questions and comments will be added to the scope
7	and that final scope will be adopted by the Village and
8	posted on the website, as well.
9	Once the scope is adopted that will be the as
10	I said, the table of contents for the E.I.S., which will
11	then be prepared and once it's adopted or accepted by the
12	Village, it will be posted on the website again for public
13	review. And at that time, there will be a formal public
14	hearing held on the G.I.S. (sic) and the annexation
15	petition, and there will be further opportunity for the
16	public to speak at that time.
17	And I'd like to indicate there's no need to
18	repeat comments if someone before you has made the comment.
19	We will incorporate all comments into the record and into –
20	- take them under consideration for the draft scope.
21	So I invite the first speaker, Mr. Gelb, to
22	as a representative of the petition, annexation
23	Petitioners.
24	MR. GELB: Honorable Village Mayor, Village

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Page 10 Boards of Trustees of the Village of Kirvas Joel, Town Supervisor, Town Board Members of the Town of Monroe, good My name is Simon Gelb and I filed the annexation evening. petition on December 27th, 2013 on behalf of the property owners, which is the subject of tonight's scoping meeting. As Mr. Steven Barshov, the counsel to the property owners who have petitioned the annexation, was unable to attend tonight, I am here to recite his statement as follows. (Reading) It is very important that the Village Board hears and receives public comment concerning the scope of the draft environmental impact statement that will analyze the potential impacts of the proposed five-hundredand-seven-acre annexation. Although scoping generally and the scoping -- and the public scoping meeting, in particular, are not required by law, the annexation Petitioners are very pleased that the Village Board has elected to commence tonight's public meeting on the scope of the draft environmental impact statement. We suggest that the Village Board accepts written comments for ten days after tonight's public scoping session so that those who might not have been able to attend here tonight can have the same input as those who are present tonight. We are looking forward to a robust

Page 11 and total environmental review, one that will carefully 1 analyze all of the potential significant adverse 2 environmental impacts of the proposed annexation in 3 4 accordance with the requirements of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act. 5 Thoughtful public comments can aid in assuring 6 7 that the environmental review is properly focused and targeted. So with that in mind, we eagerly await the 8 9 public's thoughts and input regarding the scope of the draft environmental impact statement. 10 11 Thank you. 12 MR. WELLS: Thank you, Mr. Gelb. 13 The next speakers, in order, are David Church, 14 Steven Welle, Dan Richmond. 15 Mr. Church? 16 MR. CHURCH: Mayor Wieder, Gentlemen, thank you 17 for the time. My name is David Church. I'm the Commissioner of Planning of Orange County, 124 Main Street, 18 19 Goshen, New York. I'm here to make comments for the County 20 of Orange coordinated with the county executive, Steven Neuhaus. 21 22 First and foremost, the executive has asked me 23 to note that he's going to continue to pursue New York State statutory change to ensure that counties have a more 24

Page 12 robust and significant role statutorily in annexation 1 reviews, particularly at this scale and a scale at which 2 the county has significant involvement, both in terms of 3 lands and services. 4 5 Second, a procedural matter, we want to again reinforce the notion that we anticipate to be treated, the 6 7 County, as an interested party under SEQR and, therefore, we get to share all documentation as it's come forward and 8 9 as you have done previously. 10 We provided a series of technical comments. Ι 11 provided them to your consultant and your attorney, as 12 well. I'll just take one minute, I guess, it's not three 13 hours, it's three minutes to make -- just highlight some of 14 those. 15 First and foremost, the County's interests are 16 largely related, particularly given the scale of this, to 17 the impacts on the county services provided, which range from the support of bus services through to Medicaid and 18 19 other services. We're interested in that, in particular. 20 We also have a role to play here because there are county lands affected, both easements right-of-ways 21 and, in the case of this proposed annexation proposal, 22 23 actual county-owned land, the gateway parcels to the 24 Gonzaga Park. So we're particularly and acutely interested

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Page 13 in how annexation will proceed and what the ultimate 1 outcome is in terms of development of building on those 2 county parcels and those county services. 3 Second, we think that the D.E.I.S. needs to 4 cover as adequately as possible a series of reasonable 5 alternatives to annexation, as well as, if annexation were 6 7 to proceed, alternatives to how that property may be built out, either under current zoning or other zoning proposals 8 9 as are possible. 10 That buildout analysis, we suggest, should 11 include a demographic profile to offer both sociologically and demographically what kind of residents are expected, 12 what kind of service demands would be needed, and, in 13 14 particular, what kind of county services and facilities 15 might be required to meet those expanded needs. 16 We're prepared to help. The county executive 17 has requested that my department actually not only comment on your process, but we expect to run what's been described 18 19 as a parallel review process, where the department is 20 planning to do independent buildout analysis once we get additional information on what you expect to be in terms of 21 22 reasonable alternatives. 23 Additionally and in the interest of time, we 24 provided some previous technical comments. We note, in

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1	particular, that our adding to that some concern about
2	impacts on aquifers and surface water resources,
3	particularly as they relate to both the Moodna Creek and
4	Ramapo Watershed.
5	And I appreciate the time.
6	MR. WELLS: Steven Welle?
7	MR. WELLE: Good evening. I'm Steven Welle, the
8	Mayor of Village of Harriman, 1 Church Street in Harriman.
9	I'm here this evening to listen to what you and
10	other speakers have to say regarding the proposed five-
11	hundred-and-seven-acre annexation. Unfortunately, this is
12	probably a waste of time for everyone in the audience
13	because you've proven your lack of interest in cooperating
14	with your neighbors in following the laws of the land.
15	On February 25th, 2014, the Village of Harriman
16	sent a request, requesting involved agency status in
17	connection with the proposed five-hundred-and-seven-acre
18	annexation request. No response.
19	On September 9th, 2014 the Village of Harriman
20	requested involved agency status in connection with the
21	proposed one-hundred-and-sixty-four-acre annexation
22	request. Again, no response.
23	On September 30th, 2014, Village of Harriman
24	Attorney Ostrer sent a letter to your consultants and to

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1	Mr. Szegedin, regarding your lack of communication
2	regarding our request to be an involved agency and again
3	requested involved agency status. No response.
4	You have not had the decency or courtesy to
5	reply to any of these requests. You just keep moving
6	forward, like the rest of us don't exist. Why should we
7	believe that now you're going to listen to our concerns
8	tonight?
9	I know that these annexation requests only
10	relate to the land, not any particular development, but we
11	all know you're not interested in annexing this land to
12	leave it zoned as is. You are looking to accommodate your
13	population explosion with high-density housing. If there
14	is going to be any credibility to this scoping session and
15	the subsequent SEQR process, it has to be looked at and
16	studied as though it were developed as high-density housing
17	and its ability to be sustained by the property owners, not
18	us.
19	Once again, unfortunately, I believe that this
20	is a waste of all of our time due to your history of
21	ignoring your laws and your total lack of cooperation with
22	your neighbors. And I don't see that that's going to
23	change now. But you have an opportunity to prove me wrong.
24	Do an honest and open SEQR based on reality, not a fairy

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1	tale.
2	Thank you.
3	MR. WELLS: Dan Richmond?
4	MR. RICHMOND: Good evening. My name is Daniel
5	Richmond. I'm a partner with the law firm of Zarin and
6	Steinmetz which represents United Monroe, which is a
7	citizens group committed to transparent and open
8	government.
9	First, United Monroe wants to make it clear that
10	it has no issue with the Village residents, themselves,
11	many of whom are friends and who would very likely want to
12	see the same transparency and open government that United
13	Monroe seeks.
14	Also United Monroe is appearing tonight under a
15	full reservation of rights. United Monroe, for example,
16	believes this entire annexation violates the establishment
17	clause of the United States' constitution, which prohibits
18	political line drawn based on religious criteria.
19	United Monroe also believes that the Department
20	of Environmental Conservation erred in selecting Kiryas
21	Joel as the lead agency for this review, which I would
22	submit is confirmed by the Village's insistence on going
23	forward with this hearing this evening when inclement
24	weather prevents many potentially impacted residents from
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1	attending. Frankly, it shows complete disregard for the
2	public and is contrary to SEQRA's intent of promoting
3	public participation.
4	Subject to these reservations, United Monroe
5	must advise you that the scoping document is wholly
6	deficient. The scoping document, for example, does not
7	clearly require the E.I.S. to discuss the impacts of high-
8	density development in the annexed areas, which is the
9	primary purpose of the annexation. According to the
10	business plan that the Village submitted to the State
11	Environmental Facilities Corp in connection with its
12	aqueduct project, there will be eight hundred and fifty-
13	five new residential connections and fifteen hundred new
14	commercial connections by 2045.
15	The Village told the State E.F.C. that the
16	rezoning and redevelopment of the annexed area, quote,
17	would accommodate the anticipated growth described in the
18	business plan. Assuming six people would live in these new
19	residence, this means more than fifty thousand additional
20	people. The E.I.S. obviously needs to consider the adverse
21	impacts of this extraordinarily high-density development on
22	the environment and on the neighboring communities.
23	Moreover, the E.I.S. needs to consider the
24	Village's systemic disregard for environmental regulations

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Page 18 and other laws affecting the public interest and the 1 2 unregulated development this situation allows. Last year, United Monroe made a Freedom of Information request to the 3 4 Village -- request to the Village that it provide basic 5 information relating to its planning, zoning, and environmental review processes. 6 7 The Village's response confirms that the Village routinely ignores basic land use environmental laws, 8 9 including that the Village never makes any determinations 10 under SEQR for projects under consideration within its 11 boundaries, never refers any land use applications to the 12 Orange County Planning Department as the law requires, and 13 so on. 14 Additionally, the Village's repeated violations 15 of state environmental laws, such as the Clean Water Act, 16 further demonstrates its inability or unwillingness to 17 protect its citizens and the environment. Given that the SEQR review is intended to assist the Village and the Town 18 19 of Monroe in determining whether annexation is in the 20 public interest, the E.I.S. must consider the adverse impacts of high-density housing, unregulated development, 21 22 and legal non-compliance that the annexation would bring. 23 The scope contains multiple other gaps and a 24 variety of critical substantive errors which United Monroe

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1	will expand upon in its forthcoming written submission.
2	Thank you.
3	MR. WELLS: Next speaker, John Allegro. And
4	after Mr. Allegro, Bruce Pollack.
5	MR. ALLEGRO: Good evening. I would like to say
6	that it's a shame that anybody had to leave their homes
7	tonight. It's a disaster out there and no thank you to the
8	Village of K.J. for refusing to postpone this meeting.
9	In 1801, the Danbury Baptist Association of
10	Connecticut wrote a letter to President Jefferson, their
11	concern that the state government whose ancient charter
12	considered religion as the first object of legislation
13	would treat religious opinion as favors granted by
14	government, rather than inalienable rights.
15	President Jefferson responded in agreement. He
16	wrote, Believing that religion is believing with you
17	that religion is a matter which lies solely between man and
18	his God, I contemplate with sovereign reverence that act of
19	the whole American people which declared that their
20	legislature should make no law respecting an establishment
21	of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof.
22	What would this nation be had Mr. Jefferson and
23	our founding fathers not had the foresight to build that
24	wall that separates church and state?

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1	Sadly, I stand before a government that is
2	utterly lost on the lessons of history and the rule of law.
3	What legitimately functioning constitutional government
4	would endorse a letter to the D.E.C. from their own council
5	which states that petitioners want the additional services
6	of places of worship and mikvahs as a reason for
7	annexation? What kind of municipal governments signs off
8	on a village comprehensive plan that states there are also
9	other developed properties occupied in part by persons who
10	currently use Kiryas Joel facilities and houses of worship
11	that could be annexed into the village and could almost
12	double the current village area?
13	Planned land grabs. Why would a government
14	official like Mr. Szegedin state the Petitioners are a
15	bunch of Hasidic Jewish families who reside in homes on the
16	outskirts of K.J. and have a desire to associate with the
17	residents of K.J. with whom they share much in common,
18	including religion?
19	These points are false and repugnant because no
20	municipal boundaries hinder any citizen within or outside
21	of Kiryas Joel from exercising their inalienable rights to
22	religious opinion. Kiryas Joel is a monotheistic,
23	monocultural aberration. Quite plainly stated, it is a
24	theocracy. A yes vote for Kiryas Joel annexation is, by

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1	design, an allocation of political power based on a
2	religious criterion, a violation of the law of the land,
3	the establishment clause of our great constitution.
4	This is one reason why this hearing is a fraud.
5	No matter how you abuse the legal process, the rule of law
6	will ultimately be served. We will not back down.
7	MR. WELL: It will be most helpful if we keep
8	our comments to the scope as that's the purpose of the
9	meeting so that we can work with the scope to prepare the
10	E.I.S. that then will be subject to your review.
11	Bruce Pollock, the next speaker?
12	MR. POLLOCK: Ladies and Gentlemen who bothered
13	to come out tonight in this terrible night, thank you for
14	coming. And I'd like to thank you for the opportunity to
15	express my concerns about the proposed annexation. Some of
16	the points have been stated before; yet, they bear
17	repeating until you realize just how important and correct
18	they are.
19	The Village of Kiryas Joel, through its minions,
20	is attempting to circumvent the master plan of the Town of
21	Monroe by filing this annexation petition. This attempt to
22	grab land from the Town of Monroe is not in the best
23	interest of anyone in the Town of Monroe, except for the
24	Kiryas Joel community.

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1	Time and time again, the Village of Kiryas Joel
2	has proven it has a blatant disregard for the environmental
3	laws, the building codes, and the welfare of its neighbors.
4	Kiryas Joel has a lengthy track record of being terrible
5	stewards of the environment. Some recent examples include
6	the K.J. sewage plant, which had been operating without
7	proper permits since last summer and releasing effluent
8	into the Ramapo River.
9	In October, the K.J. poultry plant was fined for
10	discharging slaughterhouse waste into our waters. And
11	after receiving permission to build a water pipeline with
12	an eighteen-inch diameter, Kiryas Joel completely
13	disregarded that order and installed a twenty-four-inch
14	pipeline instead. Compound this with a village government
15	that has been completely uncooperative and lacks
16	transparency to the rest of Monroe citizens.
17	I've repeatedly filed FOIL request for
18	information, never getting a response even though the state
19	law requires one.
20	Next, shall we talk about the financial burden
21	this will bring upon Orange County residents and the state,
22	as well? With already ninety-three percent of its citizens
23	on Medicaid, as well as a myriad of other social programs,
24	how does this community reconcile their actions with their

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1	beliefs? Each of us must have a moral compass.
2	And when you, as a community, turn a blind eye
3	to the fact that you are building a village on the backs of
4	other hardworking, taxpaying Orange County citizens,
5	counting on social programs to grow, it's not right and
6	it's not fair.
7	I understand and appreciate the historical
8	imperative that drives the growth of this community. Yet,
9	it does not excuse the heavy-handed disregard for your
10	neighbors.
11	And to the leaders of Kiryas Joel, I ask you to
12	take good care of your people. Reach deep into your own
13	pockets to finance your growth, instead of counting on
14	others. Teach your citizens to be independent and self-
15	supporting. Social programs are designed to give people a
16	helping hand, not as a way of life.
17	This annexation will destroy the natural
18	ecosystem on the five hundred and seven acres, displace the
19	wildlife currently living there, and further pollute our
20	waters, create a large drain on the infrastructure of the
21	area, and benefit only the Village of Kiryas Joel.
22	Thank you.
23	MR. WELLS: Next speaker, Liz Ridgeway.
24	MS. RIDGEWAY: Liz Ridgeway, Town of Monroe. I

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Page 24 have something to hand in to you and I'll do that after I 1 2 speak. 3 I'd like to take the rest of my minutes to discuss the following. There are many flaws in the way the 4 5 New York State annexation laws are written. One of these flaws is that the requesting municipality is given lead 6 7 agency in the SEQR review. This requesting municipality, the Village of Kiryas Joel, has had many environmental 8 9 deficiencies and fines levied against them in the past, as 10 well as very recently, but nonetheless was awarded the lead 11 agency role. 12 The even bigger flaw is whom the financial decision maker is. Our flawed decision maker is the Town 13 14 Board of Monroe, a board who has shown it lacks consistency 15 in decision making, lacks the ability to properly run a 16 town board meeting, and lacks the ability to make the 17 simplest of decisions, a board that has stated over and over again, since this petition was submitted back in 18 19 December of 2013, that it is not capable of making this 20 decision and that a host of others take over for them such as the D.E.C., the county executive, Steve Neuhaus, Senator 21 22 Larkin, Congressman Sean Maloney, and the list goes on. 23 The Monroe Town Board recently made a decision 24 on an annexation petition that was before them. The

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decision was made February 3rd in 2014. Ironically, the 1 name of this petition was the All Mine Annexation Petition. 2 Ironic, because Kiryas Joel's mantra seems to be what's 3 4 mine is mine and what yours is mine. 5 The land in this annexation petition was approximately forty-five acres and was a single, unimproved 6 7 lot zoned S.R. ten, single family residential. The builder was seeking to annex because he was given preliminary 8 subdivision approval by the Town of Monroe Planning Board 9 10 contingent on the Petitioner securing an agreement with the 11 Village of Monroe to supply water to the proposed twenty-12

12 one-lot subdivision. The Town of Monroe does not have a 13 central water supply to serve the development.

14 The Town Board declined the annexation on the basis that the All Mine Annexation is not in the best 15 16 interest of the overall public interest pursuant to 711 of 17 General Municipal Law in the State of New York. The Board went on to say the property in question doesn't have 18 19 central water supply to serve the development, a situation 20 which existed when the Applicant purchased the property. The Petitioner can develop the land consistent with the 21 22 Town's water services.

I guess they're saying buyer beware. Know whereyou bought and live within the rules. The Town of Monroe

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1	stands to lose tax ratable should the property be annexed
2	and developed as part of the Village of Monroe.
3	The Petitioner said the Village has a police
4	department and the Town of Monroe doesn't, to which the
5	Board responded police services are provided through the
6	state police, who will continue to provide services to the
7	subject property, thereby negating the reason as a basis
8	for annexation. Any proposed infrastructure change would
9	directly impact the Town of Monroe. Any park land that the
10	Village has with the exception of a small park is available
11	to town residents and would remain available and/or
12	monitored and maintained by a joint park commission through
13	the town and the village.
14	Based on these reasons set forth therein, the
15	property should remain within the Town of Monroe. One of
16	the best ways to make decisions is to be consistent with
17	all of your decisions, so as not to show favoritism to one
18	party over another.
19	MR. WELLS: Next speaker, Dr. Steven Pavia. And
20	then Emily Convers after that.
21	MR. PAVIA: Good evening. Thank you for having
22	us tonight.
23	Recently I heard a rabbi from your village speak
24	and I learned a lot. He was very interesting. He said

Page 27 that, according to the Torah, one of the main principles of 1 the Torah is that the people respect their neighbors, live 2 3 in peace and harmony with their neighbors. 4 Having this meeting tonight, I called Mr. 5 Szegedin's office, asking to have another meeting at some point because a lot of the people could not make it tonight 6 7 because of the weather. If you do that, that would be respectful to your neighbors. I would like to see that 8 9 happen. That's not why I came up here tonight. 10 But I own a chiropractic office on Route 208, 11 right off the exit of 130 on Route 17. I want to know if 12 you -- if this annexation goes through and you build highdensity housing, how are people going to come in and out of 13 14 that village or out of that new community? Are you going 15 to take Route 17 and have all the people come off of 17 16 onto Exit 130 onto Route 208? If that's the case and I'm 17 figuring roughly, I heard, a population estimate of twenty to fifty thousand more people. 18 19 Considering the vehicles, the private vehicles 20 that you own, the taxicabs, the construction vehicles, the business vehicles that will come in and out of that 21 22 village, how do you expect to get all those vehicles in and out of that Route 130 exit? Do you plan to expand the ramp 23 24 to the exit? Do you plan on widening Route 208, which is

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1	right now a one-lane highway? It's not even a highway,
2	it's a one-lane road. It's a country road.
3	Even tonight with the weather, people were all
4	backed up. If one car has a problem on exit on Route
5	208, there's a line of cars waiting because it's a one-lane
6	highway.
7	I don't believe that this annexation can go
8	through without the proper studies of Route 208 into South
9	Blooming Grove, of Exit 130 on Route 17, and please
10	consider the businesses that are in that area and the
11	office complex that I happen to be across the street from
12	that, right off that exit there are radiology offices,
13	there are doctors' offices in that complex that will be
14	severely impacted by not only the buildout of that
15	community, but the construction to get that to happen.
16	All right. So I hope that you will please
17	consider that in your SEQRA.
18	Thank you.
19	MR. WELLS: Emily Convers?
20	MS. CONVERS: Emily Convers, Village of Monroe.
21	First of all, I find your decision not to
22	reschedule this evening's public scoping session extremely
23	telling. It tells me a few things. One, you have no
24	regard for public participation. Two, you have no regard

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Page 29 for public safety. And three, you clearly have a stake in 1 2 the approval of this annexation, since, by having it on the 3 night of a blizzard, you are assured fewer comments. Most public sessions produce many more verbal 4 5 comments than written ones. And by holding this meeting, you are sure to receive less input on the five-hundred-and-6 7 seven-acre annexation than you would have had you rescheduled. This scoping session is a farce. 8 9 You continue to claim that this annexation was simply the work of a group of homeowners who wish to be 10 11 part of the K.J. community. In Ari Felberman's letter to 12 the editor, in last Friday's Photo News, he confirmed for 13 me that you are still sticking to that story. You, the 14 Village Board of K.J., have a stake in the approval of this 15 annexation. You are biased. You want this land. You've 16 expressed a desire for expansion. Your proxies and 17 trustees have said it's inevitable. The D.E.C.'s decision to give K.J. lead agency is ridiculous. 18 19 In a normal annexation proceeding, the two 20 municipalities don't have a specific interest in the 21 proceeding. If a developer requests that the land he hopes 22 to build homes on can be moved to village land instead of 23 town land in order to provide municipal water to his newly constructed homes, then the village may very well think 24

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sure, it would be nice to have additional tax money to play with, but said village surely won't be making twenty-five thousand dollars per water hook-up as is the case in this annexation.

And in an average annexation, you certainly won't have a massive water pipeline loan, which requires annexation in order to collect the twenty-five thousand dollars per water hook-up in order to repay the loan.

9 We have a conflict here, ladies and gentlemen, a 10 big conflict. And the D.E.C. made a big mistake in handing 11 the review process to the Village of Kiryas Joel since you have a proven track record of environmental violations. 12 But here we are, going through the motions, you acting as 13 14 though you have every right to do what you do, and the 15 voting majority of Monroe outside of Kiryas Joel are 16 opposed to this process. And by your words and your deeds, 17 you have shown us that you simply do not care.

18 I wish that you wouldn't insist on forcing our 19 hand, but we will be taking legal action should you move 20 forward in approving this illegal annexation.

21 MR. WELLS: Next speaker, Jason Gabari and then 22 Debbie Behringer.

23 MR. GABARI: How you doing? I'm Jason Gabari.
24 I live at 258 Elm Street in Monroe, New York.

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1	I'm just going to get my notes up. I wanted to
2	say before I started that last week my mother broke her
3	leg, tripping on ice. To have people come out in this
4	weather is disgraceful. The Town Board of Monroe, I can't
5	believe you would not even ask K.J. to delay this. It's
6	completely a disrespect to all your people and I'm very
7	upset about that.
8	Now, on a lighter note tomorrow is Purim. May
9	you all celebrate it with the greatest of lust for life.
10	I'm a nurse. I work in an operating room. This last
11	month, I can't tell you how many people I saw break their
12	legs because of bad weather like this. It's truly a
13	disrespect for humanity and I'm very upset about that, once
14	again.
15	The last time I came here to a scoping session,
16	I saw garbage all over the streets. Is that what we want?
17	I mean, we should yes, cities are great and they can be
18	very environmentally sound, but how can we trust that with
19	garbage all over the streets?
20	On another note, I wanted to talk about the
21	people of K.J. that have no voice, that are afraid to speak
22	up because they're afraid to lose their children's schools,
23	their their temple. They have no voice because they
24	live in a theocratic fascist society that doesn't give them

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1	the permission to speak their mind about things.
2	And from one of them, I was told to say this
3	today. And please forgive me; I've never spoken Hebrew
4	before, so it may be kind of crappy but.
5	(Speaking in Hebrew).
6	I want to talk about population. Every ten
7	years, the population is going to double. Now that means
8	right now you're going to get about double the amount of
9	acreage that you have. In another ten years, you'll need
10	two more acres. That's four two more square miles.
11	That's four square miles. The Town of Monroe only has
12	twenty square miles, from what I understand from reading on
13	Wikipedia. That means in twenty years, you're going to
14	need eight and in thirty, you're going to need sixteen. In
15	less than thirty-five years, the population will exceed
16	that of the whole Town of Monroe.
17	And with all this garbage, where are we going to
18	be living? It's about respect. It's about sustainability.
19	I've seen the ads we've gotten. It is about those things.
20	And please think about that because we are all human and we
21	all deserve that respect that any god would want.
22	And I would welcome any of you to my home to see
23	what I live like. We are not animals. We are very
24	respectful of all people and all religions. But when you

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1	enforce your religion on your people and your own views of
2	your religion, you are asking that you are it's fascist
3	and I think you guys know something about fascism.
4	Thank you.
5	MR. WELLS: Next speaker, Debbie Behringer and
6	then Fran Perchick.
7	MS. BEHRINGER: Hi, my name is Debbie Behringer
8	and I live in the Village of Monroe.
9	You know, one thing, it's probably been said
10	before, but we hear a lot now from your P.R. firm that
11	you're good neighbors. And I'm repeating it about the
12	weather. I had read on our town website and I heard at our
13	town board meeting because I attend just about all of them
14	that we would be able to get a dial-a-bus here. And I
15	wasn't going to take the dial-a-bus until I saw what the
16	weather was like because it quickly went from no snow to a
17	really big storm.
18	So when I called Mr. Burke to find out about our
19	dial-a-bus because I know there would probably be more
20	people here, I was told that we could fit in a Tahoe. They
21	were going to drive back and forth on a Tahoe. Well, that
22	doesn't work because that holds probably six people. So I
23	don't know how you're being good neighbors also here when
24	we're having this meeting in the snow. Luckily, I have a

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1	friend who drove me with four-wheel drive. This is
2	supposed to be for the public and we need to look out for
3	each other's safety.
4	I've lived in Monroe for forty years. My
5	parents grew up Brooklyn and we moved to Monroe because
6	it's such a great community. They moved here for the rural
7	character, the mountains, the yards, the schools.
8	And my husband and I decided that we wanted to
9	raise our four children here, also. The people are
10	friendly. We bought a house in an existing neighborhood.
11	We didn't expect someone to give us land. We bought a
12	house that had already been built. And I really appreciate
13	the mountains as I'm driving home.
14	I teach up in Pine Bush and when I come home I
15	look at the beautiful mountains. But now as I'm going down
16	Rye Hill Road, I see beautiful mountains and then water
17	towers and huge high-density housing right in the middle.
18	And it's not really nice to look at. I like to look at the
19	beautiful mountains.
20	I graduated from Monroe Woodbury and I know
21	that's an amazing school district. That is one of the main
22	reasons why we chose to raise our children here. People
23	move here from Rockland, Westchester, Long Island, and
24	Bergen County because of the phenomenal school district.

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Page 35 We pay a lot in taxes and it's mostly school taxes and we 1 know that. I'm okay with that because of what a great 2 district it is, the teachers, the administrators, the 3 4 coaches, the sports programs, the music programs. 5 This annexation cannot happen. The land sits in the Monroe Woodbury School District. It affects 6 7 everything. You'll be able to run for the school board. You won't have the same interests that we have. There'll 8 9 be a lot of people living in those high-density housing. 10 And I really also do not believe that that is better for 11 the environment. The amount of water that's going to be 12 used for showers and sewers and everything. How is that better for the environment? I don't know. 13 14 We've seen what happened in East Ramapo where 15 programs were cut and nobody was listened to. And we don't 16 want that to happen. This scoping session should not be 17 happening. You should not have lead agency. 18 You've not been good neighbors. You violate 19 environmental laws. There's big buses driving to Target 20 and Walmart. There's a lot fumes coming from them. We know what's happened with the chicken plant. There's salt 21 22 that goes into the drinking water. Building codes are 23 ignored. How is this being a good neighbor? 24 Then I was offended when a flier was sent to my

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Page 36 home that was also printed in the Photo News. It was sent 1 2 out, conveniently, yesterday. It came to my house right 3 before the scoping session. It was half a page in the 4 Photo News. I want to put us here. Us, the other citizens from Monroe that they don't have our voice heard, not at 5 our town board meetings and not here. 6 7 We, the people of Monroe, we respect tradition and opinion. We commit to quality education and 8 9 opportunity. We care for the vulnerable. We seek solutions to complex problems. We ensure a sustainable 10 11 future. This should not be happening --12 MR. WELLS: Ms. Behringer, I ask that you wrap 13 up, if you would, please. 14 MS. BEHRINGER: -- and annexation does not mean 15 taking away land and rezoning it to best suit your needs. 16 MR. WELLS: Next speaker, Fran Perchick and then 17 Carlos Valle. MS. PERCHICK: Hi; I'm Fran Perchick from the 18 19 Town of Monroe and I appreciate your time tonight. 20 I'm here because I have serious concerns, as do my neighbors, about the threat of this proposed annexation 21 22 to a sustainable future in the Town of Monroe and in the surrounding area. Should the five hundred and seven acres 23 in question become annexed into Kiryas Joel, there would be 24

Page 37 many negative impacts across the region. 1 2 During the SEQRA process, it is required by law that very careful attention be paid to clearly and 3 accurately identify the many serious impacts to land, water 4 5 quality, the Ramapo River, quality of life, and rural community character of the entire area and surrounding 6 7 towns, our beautiful viewscape, and impact to wildlife as 8 projected clearcutting and unrestrained development will 9 surely occur. 10 High-density housing is what you want, but 11 that's not sustainable. And it's not sustainable here and 12 it's not what everyone else wants. Your plan and your history of ongoing environmental violations does not 13 14 inspire confidence that Kiryas Joel will do its due 15 diligence during the SEQRA process or be environmentally responsible after that process, should the land become 16 17 annexed. 18 Alternatives to annexation really should be 19 considered that better serve all of the residents of our 20 region. We must emphasize that we're all in this together. We're neighbors. We need to plan a sustainable future for 21 22 everyone, all of us, that protects the environment and 23 everyone's interests. 24 I thank you for listening.

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1	MR. WELLS: I have two more speakers listed. If
2	anyone else wishes to speak, please sign up in the back.
3	MR. VALLE: Thank you, Village Board and
4	Officials, for the opportunity to speak.
5	I'm here on behalf of Assemblyman James Skoufis,
6	who is up in Albany this evening participating in important
7	budget conferencing. Assemblyman Skoufis has sent the
8	following statement to be read into the record.
9	MR. WELLS: Can you state your name, please, for
10	the record?
11	MR. VALLE: Carlos Valle.
12	(Reading) Thank you for a chance to provide my
13	thoughts on this very important issue. That said, I'm
14	deeply concerned that the decision was not made to postpone
15	tonight's scoping session in light of the winter weather
16	advisory in effect until ten a.m. tomorrow. Many residents
17	are not here due to the inclement and dangerous weather
18	outside, thereby disenfranchising countless people,
19	rendering this scoping session unequivocally inadequate.
20	As your recent mailer to Monroe states, I
21	respectfully remind you that a community strength is
22	revealed in its values. While I will reiterate the points
23	I raised at the first scoping session last year,
24	particularly the fact that Kiryas Joel officials, not

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1	independent property owners, are the driving force behind			
2	this petition, I will raise another set of concerns.			
3	Namely, as you know, Kiryas Joel proceeded with			
4	a second scoping session for a hundred-and-sixty-four-acre			
5	petition last year despite the fact that a five-hundred-			
6	and-seven-acre petition encompassing the same land was			
7	filed first. Now, Kiryas Joel has sued individuals that			
8	have submitted a petition to move much of the same land			
9	into the Town of Blooming Grove. On what grounds? That			
10	the K.J. petition was filed first? This double standard			
11	would be laughable if the issue wasn't so serious.			
12	Regardless of what your interpretation of			
13	annexation law is on the matter, the law applies to			
14	everyone, all the time, not just when it's convenient. No			
15	number of mailers or statements from your P.R. firm will			
16	result in peace amongst neighbors. Taking concrete actions			
17	that demonstrate a willingness to work together will.			
18	So again, I call on you to withdraw your			
19	annexation petition and constructively meet with all of our			
20	community stakeholders. Anything less, and you're			
21	continuing to prove that peace and harmony is nothing more			
22	than a nice slogan.			
23	Thank you for letting me speak.			
24	MR. WELLS: I have one more speaker on my list,

Thank you, everyone, 3 for your time. 4 My name is Chaya Wieder, a resident in Seven 5 Springs Road in the Town of Monroe. I'm one of the many applicants of the five O seven acres annexation application 6 7 and I thank you for the opportunity to listen to our 8 concerns. 9 I would like to bring up some points and 10 recommend that appropriate studies be done regarding the 11 issues of great concern to me, my family, and my neighbors. My husband and I are hardworking people. We are blessed 12 with four children and we both work hard to raise them 13 14 while holding a job to help provide for their needs. 15 We pay one of the highest rates of school tax in 16 New York State. We pay county and town tax on our 17 property. Obviously, we pay utility tax, sewer tax, sales tax. We pay social security tax. Yes, contrary to popular 18 19 belief and to what people have accused us, we do pay income 20 tax, too. I'd like to point out to you that the director 21 22 of transportation of Monroe Woodbury School District once told a family member of mine that Seven Springs Road, where 23 24 we live, is the most or one of the most dangerous roads in

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Orange County. I would ask you to study how to improve pedestrian safety in my neighborhood. In addition to being an unsafe road, there are no streetlights and no sidewalk to speak of. I cannot allow my children to go to the nextdoor neighbor alone, not in daylight and definitely not in the dark.

7 I would hope that under the leadership of Kiryas Joel Village, these issues can and will be addressed. 8 Ι 9 would also like you to study if my family and I will be 10 eligible to have the services of the K.J. fire department 11 and K.J. public safety. It's so sad. Both stations are 12 right around the corner from me, but when I call for help, I'm told they can't service our area because I live outside 13 14 of the village.

Not to mention that on Shabbats and Jewish holidays, we really feel a lack of safety and security. We would hope that the K.J. public safety officers will add us to the regular route. I would also hope that the village bus will incorporate us into their route. We really feel cut off from the entire community without easy access to important destinations.

Every parent wants to raise their children to belong in the community where they were raised. We want our children to have access to the medical center schools

Page 42 and definitely the new village park on Larkin Drive, just 1 2 like all the other children in our community. Please include these factors in your study. 3 4 Last, but not least, I would hope to be able to 5 build some additional apartments on my vacant land so that my four children can stay living next to us. We want to 6 7 enjoy the next generation and see them grow up. I want to ask you to include in your study both issues, the issue of 8 9 building on our land and, it goes without saying, the issue 10 of providing us with water and sewer. 11 In our neighborhood, we each must maintain 12 private wells and private septic tanks. Needless to say, 13 our wells are always giving us a hard time. Will we be 14 getting water supply from K.J.? Will we finally be getting 15 sewer? We've been paying the sewer bond for many years. 16 One more question that's been bothering me for a 17 long time that I want to raise and I ask you to include in 18 your study, I want to know how much is very county taxpayer 19 saving by not having twelve thousand Kiryas Joel children 20 enrolled in the public schools funded by the taxpayers? I know how much I pay in Monroe Woodbury school taxes and I'm 21 22 also paying tuition for my children to attend private 23 schools in Kiryas Joel. So I assume the amount is 24 significant.

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1	And I also want to know why the County has
2	twenty-five hundred employees, but has not hired a single
3	K.J. resident to work in our county government.
4	I thank you all for your time and have a great
5	evening.
6	MR. WELLS: I have three additional speakers,
7	Herman Wagschal, Audra Schwartz, and then Veronica
8	Connolly.
9	MR. WAGSCHAL: Good evening, Gentlemen. My name
10	is Herman Wagschal.
11	As a resident of the Town of Monroe, I would
12	like to address an issue that many of my neighbors choose
13	not to discuss. While they call themselves United Monroe,
14	as a resident of Monroe I feel left out. While the so-
15	called United Monroe would have an entire community deemed
16	as fraudsters based on meritless grounds, I, for one, would
17	like to address some issues that are very well supported.
18	One of the concerns raised by United Monroe is
19	that the effects of annexation, if they will be approved,
20	will be potentially devastating to our environment, school
21	district, and overall quality of life. Once annexed, the
22	property will change from one point five to three acres
23	rural residence zoning to high-density building, the
24	addition of apartments and condominiums, large families

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1	will increase the population tremendously.
2	It is possible that the annexation will increase
3	the population. However, how is this a negative thing? An
4	increase in population leads to a healthy economy. An
5	increase in population will increase the overall quality of
6	life.
7	Another concern raised by the United Monroe is
8	that it will have a huge impact on taxes since Kiryas Joel
9	residents are largely below the poverty level receiving
10	many government benefits which are paid for, in part, by
11	Orange County. I, for one, would like to ask how much is
12	the county taxpayer saving by not having a single K.J.
13	resident in the county jail? How much is the county
14	taxpayer saving by not having a single K.J. resident in the
15	Valley View Nursing Home?
16	How much is the county taxpayer saving by not
17	having a single K.J. resident in the county drug
18	rehabilitation and treatment center?
19	How much is the county taxpayer saving by not
20	having a single K.J. resident in the county criminal jail?
21	How much is the county taxpayer saving by not having a
22	single K.J. resident processed by the county sheriffs? How
23	much is the county taxpayer saving by not having a single
24	K.J. resident deliver a drug baby out of wedlock?
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1	Another concern raised by the United Monroe is
2	that while Satmar Hasidic residents opt to attend private
3	school, if they are located within the Monroe Woodbury
4	School District they are still entitled to vote in the
5	school board elections, utilize special education services
6	and so on. While this concern doesn't even deserve an
7	answer, as every taxpayer is entitled to utilize the school
8	if they choose to, so it does to vote, this does uncover
9	your true colors. I urge the board to weigh the interest
10	of all of us equally, instead of being concerned
11	MR. WELLS: Mr. Wagschal, please wrap up your
12	comments.
13	MR. WAGSCHAL: about a possibility that
14	Hasidic may choose to utilize the public school while they
15	are entitled to, look to the fact as to how much the county
16	taxpayer is saving by not having twelve thousand Jewish
17	kids in K.J. residence enrolled in the Monroe Woodbury
18	School District. Annexation will only
19	MR. WELLS: Mr. Wagschal, please wrap up.
20	MR. WAGSCHAL: Annexation will only boost our
21	economy another second and enhance our quality of
22	life. Never in American society has an increase in
23	population being looked upon a negative in a negative
24	light.

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1	If this is if it is the people within the	
2	population you have an issue with, then come out and say	
3	it. Don't hide under the name of United Monroe as big as

6	MS. SCHWARTZ: Well, I don't have anything	
7	nearly that dramatic. My name is Audra Schwartz. I'm a

10	My fellow member of the planning board, Gary	
11	Abrignani, is also a Town of Monroe resident. I am here	
12	tonight to share his and my comments as he could not be

14	I'm going to stick to my questions are really	
15	fact based. We're looking for information. Number one,	
16	Section 8 housing, we're wondering the current percentage	
17	of the population receiving Section 8 subsidies now in	
18	Kiryas Joel. What is the projected percentage that Section	
19	8 recipients will receive if annexation is approved and the	
20	proposed high-density housing is built?	
21	Food stamps. I understand the K.J. community is	
22	assessed for food stamps, the SNAP program, at a different	
23	rate than the rest of Orange County. I don't know if my	
24	understanding is correct. I'd like this verified. Is this	

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1	true? If so, why? What is the different income
2	allocations used when calculating the benefits? In other
3	words, single senior receiving food stamps within K.J. will
4	receive substantially larger benefits than the same age,
5	same income senior outside the KJ community. What extra
6	cost will be incurred by the County if the K.J. population
7	increases and therefore food stamps benefits increase?
8	Three, Medicaid. What is the percentage of
9	current population of Kiryas Joel who receives Medicaid
10	benefits? What percentage of that cost is borne by the
11	taxpayers of Orange County? Extrapolate it out to the
12	projected population growth if the annexation is approved,
13	what would that cost the taxpayers of Orange County growth
14	become?
15	As Medicaid benefits cover health services
16	including medical and hospital care, infertility treatment,
17	childbirth, rehab services, as well as transportation to
18	and from medical appointments, medical equipment, and
19	skilled nursing services, what would this cost escalate to
20	if the population increases as projected?
21	HEAP, Heating Energy and Assistance Program.
22	What percentage of the current population of Kiryas Joel
23	receives HEAP grants at this time? What is the dollar
24	cost? What percentage of the Orange County total HEAP

What decisions have they made and are they qualified 8 9 and prepared to go forward with analyzing the SEQRA review? 10 And what, if any role, do you plan on having the Town of 11 Monroe Planning Board have in this review? 12 Thank you. 13 MR. WELLS: Next speaker, Veronica Connolly. 14 And then Rich Cannava. 15 MS. CONNOLLY: Good evening. Thank you for 16 taking me out of my home in this treacherous weather, but I 17 chose to be a participating member of government and so here I am. 18 19 I just would think it would be very important 20 for this review that a very hard look at how -- what effects by overpopulation and high growth of a population 21 22 would have effect on county and state services? 23 And I ask this question because, as an early 24 intervention teacher, who works within this county and who

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Page 49 services many of the children of this county, including the 1 2 sweet children of Kiryas Joel, my program is under high scrutiny right now and is being cut year after year. 3 And 4 I've taken pay cuts year after year so as to continue the 5 services of special education needs for special needs children. 6 7 I think it's very important that an overpopulation would have a negative impact on services 8 9 like this because if it's going to some of the programs 10 that Ms. Schwartz brought up, the state is not going to 11 have enough money to continue to afford the services that I provide. So what kind of impact will that have on the 12 children here who do need those services? I think that's 13 14 very important to look at. 15 And for the gentleman that spoke prior, there 16 are many family members that live in this community and 17 friends that I have who also do not use the jails or were born of drug babies or any of that stuff. I don't use 18 19 those services. I have a very great child who uses the 20 Monroe Woodbury School District because I chose to send her 21 there. 22 When I moved her I knew what my tax burden would 23 be, especially the school taxes. I moved here for that 24 school district. If families choose to send their children

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to private schools, that's by your choice. No one's asking 1 2 you to do that. I understand. I went to a private school. 3 I went to a Catholic school in Long Island. My parents 4 paid the tuition, as well as our tax, school bills and 5 county and state taxes. But to say that because you don't use jail 6 7 services or whatever services, it doesn't really hold water with me. I think an overall look at how state and county 8 9 taxes will be affected by high-density population and 10 overgrowth and the real significant impact that that will 11 have on the ecology of this area.

I didn't move here for urbanization. I moved here for rural living, not high-density living. If I wanted that, I would have stayed in Long Island or move to New York City. It was a choice for you to move here. You didn't have to, but you chose to. So respect the land and respect the ecology that you moved to. If you didn't want that, you shouldn't have moved here.

MR. WELLS: Next speaker, Rich Cannava and then Anthony Rizno -- Rizzo. Sorry. And those are the last two I have on my list.

22 MR. CANNAVA: Richard Cannava, Town of Monroe. 23 Moved up here about a year ago. Moved my family up here 24 from Fort Lee, New Jersey. I have a two-year-old son and

17	Okay. So there's an ancient Indian proverb that
18	says we do not inherit the earth from our ancestors, we
19	borrow it from our children. I try to live by this
20	whenever it comes to mind. All of this trashing of our
21	environment, it's going to catch up with us. And I don't
22	mean that to any one town or municipality here. I mean
23	that as a global world. If we don't start to take care of
24	this earth, we will lose. Okay?

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1	So this five-hundred-and-seven-acre annexation
2	petition gives me great trepidation. So I would like you
3	to look into the ramifications of the increased carbon
4	emissions due to the increased population. And you counter
5	that with deforestation of the five hundred and seven acres
6	of currently wooded area and what you have is another swing
7	in the pendulum towards climate change.
8	I'd also like to know how the five-hundred-and-
9	seven-acre petition benefits the rest of the town. Will
10	you build ball fields and parks and recreation areas that
11	my son can go to? Will it benefit the people in Monroe and
12	Chester and Woodbury, or will it only benefit Kiryas Joel?
13	The endangered species that live in the five
14	hundred and seven acres that you seek to annex, what will
15	become of them? I will submit a list to you, Mr. Wells, of
16	all of these endangered species that we do need to
17	consider.
18	The increase in flash flood that happens with
19	deforestation and then when you take away the trees and you
20	add asphalts, especially on the hills that we have here,
21	you increase the likelihood of a flash flood.
22	You know, again, I really just hope we can get
23	to a point where we can get together as a community and,
24	hopefully, make decisions that benefit everybody.
